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## MOST SIGNIFICANT CARTOON — FEBRUARY 12, 1953

More and more the news of the day is coming to us in pictures and this is especially true if television can be classified as the most accurate portrayal of a current episode. The cartoonists for a century or more have been recording a pictorial history of the important incidents in American life. The Lincoln Foundation advisory group, periodically, has been selecting the Most Significant Cartoon appearing in the newspapers for February

12th. The 1953 Recognition is given to a cartoon by Erle B. Slack "Our Reliance is in the Love of Liberty . . ." appearing in the Tulsa Daily World which is reproduced, through the kindliness of the cartoonist, in this bulletin. The quotation used by Mr. Stack as the es-sence of his cartoon is from a speech Abraham Lincoln made at Edwardsrille, Ill. on September 13, 1858, between the debates with Douglas at Freeport and Jonesboro. The paragraph from which the statement is excerpted follows:

"What constitutes the bulwark of our own liberty and independence? It is not our frowning battlements, our bristling sea coasts, the guns of our war steamers, or the strength of our gallant and disciplined army. These are not our reliance against a resumption of tyranny in our fair land. All of them may be turned against our liberties, without making us stronger or weaker for the struggle. Our reliance is in the love of liberty which God has planted in our bosoms. Our defense

is in the preservation of the spirit which prizes liberty as the heritage of all men, in all lands, every where. Destroy this spirit, and you have planted the seeds of despotism around your own doors. Familiarize yourselves with the chains of bondage, and you are pre-

yourselves with the chains of bondage, and you are pre-paring your own limbs to wear them. Accustomed to trample on the rights of those around you, you have lost the genius of your own independence, and become the fit subjects of the first cunning tyrant who rises."
