# The Literary Contributions of Louis A. Warren

Editor's Note: One should not surmise that Dr. Louis A. Warren's writings on Abraham Lincoln concluded with his retirement as Director of The Lincoln National Life Foundation in 1956. Since then he has had published a one-volume work entitled Lincoln's Youth: Indiana Years which has been included on the shelf of Essential Lincolniana. The same book was recognized by The Indiana University Writers' Conference as the best biography published in the state during 1959, the centennial year of Lincoln's birth.

Since 1959 Dr. Warren has prepared two manuscripts of book length, which will soon be published. One of these studies deals with Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and is entitled "The New Birth of Freedom." This manuscript was entered in the \$5000 contest sponsored by the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States and on July 3, 1963 received recognition as "Runner Up."

This recognition has prompted the Editor of *Lincoln Lore* to invite Dr. Warren to make a compilation of his literary contributions in the field of Lincolniana. Since the retirement of Louis A. Warren in 1956, as director of the Lincoln Na-tional Life Foundation, many inquiries about his contri-buted writings on the Lincoln family have been received. In order that we may comply more fully and accurately with these requests, Dr. Warren has been invited to compile a list of books, pamph-lets and magazines he has authored, and make a general statement about Lincoln Lore, of which he was editor and sole contributor for twentyseven years. Aside from his writings, extended speaking itineraries caused many of his addresses to be published, in full or in part by current newspapers.
