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WARREN'S REFERENCE LINCOLNIANA

The Lincoln National Life Foundation has recently received as a gift from its Director Emeritus, Louis A. Warren, fifty-five privately bound volumes of Lincolniana. They contain manuscripts, transcriptions of public records, copies of significant documents, and a compilation of sources used through the years for preparing speeches and writing monographs on Abraham Lincoln. Supplementing the uniformly bound volumes are the original editions of more than fifty Lincoln books and pamphlets he has authored, also over one hundred published contributions to national magazines and trade journals, all under separate covers.

A special nook in the Foundation library has been set apart for this collection of sources, to make it accessible, within easy reach, for reference purposes. An index to this material is made available which should facilitate the use of the fifty-five volumes which are numbered consecutively, on the backstrips. Section One, Lincoln Lore The first six volumes under Lincoln Lore in section one contain a complete set of the fourteen hundred and twenty bulletins published weekly between April 15, 1929 and June 25, 1956, and numbered consecutively. An index, bound in as an appendix to volume six, contains a list of all the titles of the bulletins, especially valuable for reference. Aside from a subject index, there is included an index of persons, containing over 10,000 names of different people in some way associated with the Lincoln story.

The chronological arrangement of the bulletins fall into this sequence for each volume. Vol. 1 — No. 1, April 15, 1929, to No. 246, Dec. 25, 1933. Vol. 2 — No. 247, Jan. 1, 1934, to No. 500, Nov. 7, 1938. Vol. 3 — No. 501, Nov. 14, 1938, to No. 768, Dec. 27, 1943. Vol. 4 — No. 769, Jan. 3, 1944, to No. 1000, June 7, 1948. Vol. 5 — No. 1001, June 14, 1948, to No. 1238, Dec. 29, 1952. Vol. 6 — No. 1239, Jan. 5, 1953, to No. 1420, June 25, 1956.

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Another complete file of the 1420 bulletins is arranged by subject matter and contains

bound volumes under *Lincoln Lore Classified*, Volumes I thru XII (Warren numbers 7 thru 18) inclusive. The classification by Warren numbers is submitted.

Section Two, The Kentucky Lincolns

Manuscripts associated with Dr. Warren's first full length book, Lincoln's Parentage and Childhood, are assembled in the volumes of Warren numbers 20 to 28 inclusive. The type written copy of the original text prepared for the publisher is bound in Warren numbers 20, 21, 22 and 23. The source material in the form of public records is assembled in Warren numbers 24, 25, 26 and 27. A volume of book reviews, Warren number 28, is also included in this section.

The original copy of the manuscript for the text contains 200,000 words. At the suggestion of the publishers, the wordage was cut in half. By the time the editors had made their additional expurgations, the final manuscript was reduced to 90,000 words (See printed text). The original format contained thirty two chapters, but the revised copy was reduced to eighteen. The captions of the earlier composition are listed with an asterisk noting the chapters eliminated. The four volumes of PUBLIC RECORDS prepared as sources for the text of the book it was hoped would be utilized as copy for a companion supplemental printing, as it consisted mainly of unprinted Lincoln and Hanks data. After more than seventy-five percent of the wordage had been deleted, the remainder served as notes for the revised text. The original abstracts as copied from the public records of Kentucky have been preserved in volumes of Warren numbers 24, 25, 26 and 27.

Warren 28 — BOOK REVIEWS AND COMMENTS ABOUT BOOK. These reviews and comments refer to Lincoln's Parentage and Childhood as it appeared in its published format and properly belong in this section.

Section Three, Speeches About Lincoln

Closely associated with Lincoln Lore bulletins and published Lincoln books as vehicles for dispersing information about Abraham Lincoln, was the Annual Speaking Itinerary arranged for Dr. Warren over a period of twenty-eight years. Several phases of the project are recorded. The manuscripts for most of the addresses, entire or in abbreviated form, are presented. Source material for these addresses found in Lincoln Lore are assembled. Reactions to the speeches by the sponsors, and press reports of many of the convocations have been preserved. One volume attempts to summarize the extent of the project geographically and the approximate number of people addressed. Volumes of Warren numbers 29 to 39 fall within this section featuring Speaking Itineraries.

Warren 29, 30 and 31 — MANUSCRIPTS. Over one hundred different speeches on Abraham Lincoln were prepared, most of them used on the annual itinerary. The engagements, usually arranged by the company representative in the town to be visited, were before groups of varied interest such as: Bar Associations, Church Congregations, Historical and Patriotic Gatherings, Legislative and Political Groups, Literary Societies, Luncheon Clubs, Military Organizations, School Assemblies, University Convocations and Women's Meetings.

Warren 32, 33 and 34 — SOURCES. Lincoln Lore served as a basic source for a great many of the addresses, but, of course, they largely supplement the address when grouped under a certain subject. The bulletins are arranged under the same subject sequence as the manuscripts and makes available much new material.

Warren 35 and 36 — REACTIONS. Early in the development of the itineraries, comments about the speeches were solicited from the sponsors of the programs to learn if the effort was worth while. The replies, along with comments from Lincoln students, are bound in the volumes noted.

Warren 37 and 38 — PRESS NOTICES. Supplementing the reactions of individuals, press notices of some of the more important engagements were received and two volumes have been utilized to display them. Thousands which reached the Foundation through a clipping service are not included.

Warren 39 — SUMMARY. This volume serves as a summary for the speaking itineraries, presenting a compilation of the 517 cities and towns visited in 42 states. The number of lectures delivered in many of the larger cities are recorded, as many as 410 in the home city of Fort Wayne. The addresses before the three leading luncheon clubs show the following totals: Kiwanis, 171; Lions, 113; and Rotary, 162. A few of the certificates presented to the speaker are bound in this volume.

Section Four - Original Manuscripts

This section is a collection of original manuscript copy for books, pamphlets and periodicals appearing under the authorship of Dr. Warren. The full title for these writings may be found in Lincoln Lore No. 1507. Volumes of Warren numbers 40, 41 and 42 include books and pamphlets that have been listed in the Foundation's Lincoln Bibliography. Volumes of Warren numbers 43, 44 and 45 compile manuscripts submitted to magazines for publication. Manuscripts and notes relating to Company and Foundation projects are found in Warren 46. Special occasion manuscripts are bound in Warren 47. Book reviews by Dr. Warren are presented in Warren 48. The original manuscript of Lincoln's Youth, Indiana Years and associated papers are preserved in Warren 49 and 50. Numbers 51 to 55 contain miscellaneuos writings.

Warren 55 — EDITORIALS. The first writings on Lincoln by Dr. Warren were prepared while he edited the Larue County Herald at Hodgenville, Kentucky. All his editorials are included. Also in this volume is a series of Lincoln quotations which he prepared as leaders for Chicago Tribune Editorials.

The Ballad of Abraham Lincoln

Many of the subscribers of Lincoln Lore have indicated a marked degree of interest in "The Ballad of Abraham Lincoln" which was published in bulletin Number 1601 and dated July, 1971. Also quite a number of requests for extra copies have been received.

One of our subscribers, Rex E. Anderson, 130 So. Vine Street, Wichita, Kansas, 67213, has helped us to identify the name of the author by calling our attention to the Monaghan item Number 924. In the *Lincoln Lore* Editor's Note, the statement is made that, "The publication bears no date or author's name and is not listed in 'Monaghan's Lincoln Bibliography 1839-1939.'" This is a true statement so far as the Fields, Osgood & Co. imprint is concerned.

However, the identical ballad bearing the imprint of Ticknor & Fields (on the cover title) contains a title page naming Bayard Taylor as the author, giving the publication date as 1870 and Sol. Eytinge, Jr., as the artist who drew the colored illustrations. According to the copyright notice, the ballad is dated 1869, the year it was most likely written.

The bibliographer notes that this same ballad with different plates and with a different arrangement of illustrations also bears the imprint of Peter G. Thompson of Cincinnati, Ohio. In addition to being a publication of verse, it is also described as a "child's picture book."
