### BIBLIOGRAPHY

It would be to the very great advantage of those who prepare Lincoln data for publication if interest in Lincoln history could be cultivated at other periods in the year besides the season surrounding Lincoln's birthday.

In January, the month of beginnings, Lincoln presented the bill to abolish slavery in the District of Columbia. The month of his birth is well cared for. The migration from Indiana to Illinois took place in March and this was the month of the inaugural. April is the month for the setting of his assassination and death, and the theme of this disaster can be carried over into May with Memorial day as the climax.

The wedding of Lincoln's parents took place in June, and the romance of Thomas and Nancy Hanks Lincoln might be featured in the month of wedding bells as well as the romance of Abraham Lincoln himself. The glorious fourth of July should invite orators and writers to use many of his patriotic utterances. During the month of August the Lincoln-Douglas debates began which open up a wide field of discussion.

The Emancipation Proclamation was issued in September. October, the month of falling leaves, witnessed the death of Abraham Lincoln's mother, in southern Indiana. The November elections offer a point of contact and with Christmas Lincoln and his children suggest timely articles.
