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PUBLISHED WORKS OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN

The first volume of *Uncollected Works of Abraham Lincoln* by Rufus Rockwell Wilson is now off the press and it covers the period from 1824 to 1840. At least four volumes are anticipated, and the set limited to 2050 numbered and signed copies. Mr. Wilson proposes "to assemble and annotate letters, speeches and other papers of Abraham Lincoln that have come to light since 1905 when and annotate letters, speeches and other papers of Abraham Lincoln that have come to light... since 1905 when Nicolay and Hay published an enlarged final edition of their complete works of Abraham Lincoln." Discoveries including unpublished items such as may appear in the Lincoln papers soon to be opened in the Library of Congress will be included in subsequent volumes. The appearance of the first installment of the Wilson work has invited a condensed summary of previous attempts to invited a condensed summary of previous attempts to compile and print the writings and speeches of the Emancipator.
