## A ROSTER OF LINCOLN IMPERSONATIONS

Occasionally it is refreshing to pick up a Lincoln book which makes little claim of objectivity and no claim of being a definitive work. Such a pub-lication is Frank McGlynn's "Side-lights on Lincoln." The publishers state that: "The book does not pretend to be an authoritative history or a complete biography." It does contain many of the personal experiences and reminiscences of the earliest of our actors who impersonated Abraham Lincoln.

We are now able to trace through We are now able to trace through McGlynn's observations one of the primary sources for the general use of the emphasis given to the three prepositions "of," "by," and "for" in the concluding paragraph of the Gettysburg Address. The popularizing of the expression of "Now, he belongs to the ages," instead of "He belongs to the ages now," as first used by Stanton, according to Tanner, our best authority, is explained. Many other authority, is explained. Many other conclusions about Lincoln himself which have crept into the thinking of Americans who have witnessed Mc-Glynn's presentations are traced to the interpretations of the actor.

Frank McGlynn may be mentioned as our earliest American actor who received any considerable popular acclaim in the role of Lincoln. However, the name of William Rea, a Belfast Irishman with a provincial brogue and but five feet eight inches tall, six inches shorter than Lincoln, was the first actor to be assigned the leading role in Drinkwater's play when it was first produced in England.

The appearance of this book has suggested the compilation of a list of the better known players and impersonators who have come before the general public in the role of Abraham Lincoln. Of course the great number of those participating in local productions and others who occa-sionally dress up like Lincoln for some occasion are omitted.

Plays where characters have merely referred to Lincoln such as the reference in Anna and the King of Siam or in the popular presentation of the Gettysburg Address by Charles Laughton in Ruggles of Red Gap are not included in the following list. Some other plays where there is a mere appearance of Lincoln or utilized primarily for amateur productions are not mentioned, in fact there is no attempt to present a complete bibliography of plays written, where Lincoln appears as one of the characters.
